Nineteen Israeli kids and adults, were murdered by Arab terrorists over the last few months.

That's the headline. But that's not the story.

The story is that 40 children became orphans overnight, because their mother or father was murdered. OneFamily Fund has immediately stepped into their lives to try to fill the void.

But it doesn't stop there. It continues.

The story is that 117 others had a brother or sister murdered, became a widow or a widower or was a loving parent one day and was suddenly forced to bury their child, murdered by Arab terrorists.

Each member of these families has been, or soon will be, embraced by OneFamily and

will continue to be guided through the process of recovery.

Sadly, OneFamily is well aware of the slow process of recovery that each member of these families will tread. We know what needs will arise and the myriad critical ways in which we can help them get through it, and live many productive years contributing to the economic welfare and emotional resilience of the State and the People of Isrsel.

Almost all of the bereaved children have been visited and assigned a OneFamily Counselor. Many have already participated in OneFamily's summer camp with 160 other kids, of their own ages, who are on the same path toward recovery.

Every member of these new families was struck by tragedy, and each will become part of our big family, the OneFamily Fund.

The unimaginable pain and sorrow they experience from their loss is traumatic, and prevents them from relating to their peers and other family members. It stalls typical development, and hurts them in school or at work.

OneFamily offers therapy, beyond what the government offers, to help mitigate their suffering, and promote emotional well-being. We help the entire family, no matter what they

need, so that they can get back on their feet, and eventually live a thriving independent life. Our psychologists and trauma specialists welcome these victims with open arms, and care for them like family. The group members become new peers, giving over the coping strategies that work best for them.

Family isn't about blood; it's about who is willing to hold your hand when you need it the most.

Please stand with our Israeli brothers and sisters who are suffering deeply. Donate as generously as you can, and you will be partnering with us to "hold someone's hand" and provide psychological counseling for relief from that unimaginable pain.

HOLIDAY CLOTHING JOY





Nehorai Gol, 12, tragically lost his father Rabbi Boaz Gol, 49, on May 8th when a terrorist murdered him with an axe while they walked through a park together. The attack took place a month before Nehorai's 13th birthday and bar mitzvah, which they had been planning together all year.

Several families got together to throw Nehorai's bar mitzvah celebration with family and friends, and shower him with love. There was a party, a

tunnel tour at the Kotel arranged by OneFamily, and a special Shabbat together.

OneFamily staff members helped Rabbi Gol's widow, Galit, and her six children by helping them deal with the overwhelming emotions that they all feel, making arrangements, checking that everything was in place, making sure that they

had food and clothing, and then enjoying the celebration together. Nehorai sang a moving song to his father in front of all of the guests. He rewrote the lyrics to "Abba" by Shlomi Shabbat: "Dad, I wanted to write words and a song about you, about everything you have been in your life, about education in love, study and mitzvah, everything was so pure in your eyes. Dad, remember the study in the synagogue, the scent of an incoming Shabbat spice, you asked if I was happy, even when I came back late with the smile hidden between your lips."

"Dad, you went on the road without coming home. You have given your all for the sake of the people of Israel and not always everything is clear. My heart is broken. I know that everything is from above. Father, time has passed and I have not delivered. Father, forgive me for telling you everything I have always felt. I promise I will not give up praying harder and asking God to keep us all."

Shlomi Shabbat saw the video of the heartfelt

performance, and sent Nehorai back a beautiful video message blessings, condolences and a song just for him. "Dear Nehorai, I want to congratulate you on reaching the age of observance. It is verv exciting that decided to dedicate my song. I am sure that your father in Heaven hears and stands in prayer

before the Creator of the world, that you may grow up in the Torah, the mitzvot, the wedding and good deeds, Amen." Then Shlomi sang his song entitled "Come Home" to Nehorai. And we are all crying together with the Gol family for their tragic loss, and happy tears for reaching this beautiful milestone with love and hope.

Our Youth Division

The Youth Division at OneFamily currently supports over 200 Israeli children between the ages of 7- 18, all of whom are bereaved, or who have an immediate family member who was severely injured. We support these young victims all year long through several programs to ensure that they are given the opportunity to flourish after their trauma: We provide weekly calls and visits, Therapeutic Camp 3x per year, monthly group programming with grief and trauma specialists, and The Big Brother/ Big Sister program, just to name a few. At-risk youth

are given special attention and extra resources, as necessary. David* is one example of a success.

Avi* is an 18 year old immigrant to Israel who loves his studies, listening to music and spending time with family and friends. He lives for Gd and focuses on being happy, despite the change and the struggles. A friend of his told him about the Big Brother program at OneFamily, and he decided to

become a big brother. David* is a 9 year old Israeli boy whose father was stabbed to death on his way to take the train home from work a few years ago. The pain of being an orphan is unimaginable and affects him in school, with his friends, and of

course with his family. The two boys were matched last year, and found a connection over time. They enjoy playing soccer together, learning new things, cooking, going for walks, and talking. Avi was trained in grief counseling in order to be a big brother, and the time he spends with David is therapeutic.

Having a big brother has changed David's life, and the positive effects are pervasive. Avi is the one "giving," but he shared with us that he has actually received more benefits than he knows

how to describe. He is forever grateful for his unique bond with David and the entire family. Their relationship has improved both of their lives forever, and with your help, we will connect many more pairs to help each other get through their trauma.

P.S. Since Avi and David love to play soccer together, they were introduced to the OneFamily Soccer Team of young adults, and their new famous coach. Now they are connected to an

older group of victims who share the same interest as they do, and they've inspired David to continue playing soccer. Maybe one day he'll be able to join the team when he grows up. **This is how we overcome trauma together.**
